## LIMM 2010 Needs and Resources Forum Care of the Aged and the Chronically Ill: A Medical Mission Approach

he 2010 LIMM Forum was held March 19 and 20 at Concordia Seminary St. Louis. **Dr. Robert Weise**, Chair in Pastoral Ministry and the Life Sciences at the seminary set the theological framework for the event with his presentation Growing Older: God's Gift of Care and Hope (An Ethic for Aging and Serving the Chronically Ill). Illness to wellness in Christ begins with forgiveness of sins. Forgiveness given and accepted brings the desperate person, the chronically ill, or the elderly suffering from the loneliness of aging and ageism to the HOPE that doesn't disappoint. Dr. Roger Weise, M.D., a geriatrician practicing in Elk Grove Village, IL (and Dr. Robert's brother) stated that aging involves loss—of loved ones, of mobility, of the senses, of position and power—and this can create depression and hopelessness. Those aging successfully have a continued sense of fun and the sense of a future. Older adults can be the instruments of much giving and caring even while accepting it for themselves. Chaplain Ted Wuerffel led evening and morning devotions. Even to Your Old Age, written by Chaplain Wuerffel, highlighted meaningful prayer time by the participants. Rev. Larry Rockemann, Chaplain, Lutheran Life Communities, revealed

in his banquet address that the mantra, 'I don't want to be a burden' is actually self-centeredness. "Life is a continuum from newborn helplessness, to independence, to interdependence, to dependence. " Dr. Alan and Carol Buckman and Rev. Tim and Rita Nickel were recognized for their support of LIMM and their involvement in medical mission work overseas and in the U S. Sponsors of the Forum were Concordia Seminary St. Louis, The Lutheran Foundation of St. Louis and LCMS World Mission.

### Dr. Abraha and Dr. Goehle to Sudan

r. Misghina Abraha and Dr. Ruth Goehle, two Lutheran physicians from St. Paul, MN served as a LIMM medical assessment team to Sudan at the request of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Sudan and LCMS World Mission East African staff. The team visited St. Paul Christian Hospital, various government and NGOs offices, and refugee camps in Khartoum . Dr. Goehle worked in a number of African countries and has a vast amount of experience in medical care delivery in developing countries, including Sudan. Dr. Abraha comes from Eritrea and has returned there for a number of short-term medical mission trips. He completed his high school education while a refugee in Sudan before being resettled in the United States. Dr. Goehle will spend 10 days in Sudan before returning to South Africa and Zimbabwe with the Lutheran Malaria Initiative. Dr. Abraha's 3 week visit will include extended consultation with the health staff of the ELCS before returning to his position as a physi-

cian at the VA Medical Center in Minneapolis. Dr. Goehle's and Dr. Abraha's evaluation and report will be a valuable tool for the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Sudan and LCMS World Mission to make informed decisions when planning medical/health outreach in Sudan as part of the ministry of the church to the communities they serve.
