A Message from our Executive Director

Who could have ever imagined that we would be where we are today...quarantined in the middle of a pandemic! I turned to God's Word for comfort and found Psalm 91. Here are a few excerpts: "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust. Surely he will save you...from the deadly pestilence...under his wings you will find refuge. You will not fear...the pestilence that stalks in the darkness, nor the plague that destroys at midday...no harm will overtake you. I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him." I pray that you are trusting in HIM and HIS promises during this difficult time.

So just what is LIMM doing in this quarantine? Great question! Our BOD met in early March and pledged \$19,000 in grants, which brings the total to over \$23,000 this year! This is only possible through the wonderful donations from you, our faithful sponsors! This year, we will be purchasing a portable ultrasound machine for home visits in Madagascar, partnering with Chicago Lutheran School's Super Hero medical education program, providing funds for 2 nurses and interpreter to teach CHE in Belize, feeding 40 students in Seine Bight for a year, purchasing 8 car seats for KidSafe program, and providing CHE training for a LCMS missionary.

In April, we welcomed 6 new Board members, featured in this month's newsletter. They bring a wealth of experience in ministry, missions, and medicine, and join current board members Linda Jurgens, Hector Hoppe, and David Wesche. It is with deep sadness that we said goodbye to Harold Melser, who went to his heavenly home in February. We will miss him on the Board, but rejoice that we'll see him again someday. Please lift up the Board in your prayers! Thanks for your commitment to LIMM during this difficult time.

Car Seats for KidSafe Program



Lutherans in Medical Missions partnered with Lutheran Social Services of North Florida to purchase 8 car seats for their KidSafe program. These car seats are distributed to low-income families that are unable to purchase a high quality seat that will safely transport their children/toddlers. Parental training, life skills and health education are also provided. The CDC notes that having access and correctly using child safety seats reduces the risk for death to infants and toddlers by 70%. Thank you, donors, for providing these car seats!

Mosquito Nets for CLET Lutheran Seminary

Rev. Micah Wildauer writes, "On behalf of the students of the Centre Lutherien de'Etudes Theologiques in

Dapaong, Togo, I thank you for the generosity and kindness shown to us by the donation of 30 mosquito nets. Steph Schulte, Africa Regional Coordinator for Mercy Medical Work, was able to deliver them at the end of February. We wanted to present them in a ceremony at the beginning of the third trimester, but the government has shut down all public gatherings and events. We are looking for a time to present them to our students highlighting the importance of proper maintenance, provide instruction for the children, and give opportunity to express thanksgiving to the Lord for such a gift. Our African partners know full well the value of this gift. Durable nets are difficult to acquire in Togo. Many of our students have lost family members to malaria and other fevers caused by



mosquitos. We are truly indebted to your kindness and pray that the Lord will bless your endeavors to love your neighbor, even those who are unknown and at a distance. The peace of the Lord be with you in abundance."
