# **In Memory of Harold Melser**

# The Madagascar Report

Madagascar is the 4<sup>th</sup> largest island in the world, situated off the eastern coast of Africa, and home to 28 million people. Prior to the COVID outbreak, LCMS Short Term Mission teams (MMT) worked with the Lutheran Hospital in Antsirabe conducting medical clinics, teaching medical/surgical techniques and bringing health supplies. On average 3,000 people are treated during the 10-day trips. Inspired by God's mercy, Dr. Harison, chief surgeon at the hospital, and his wife Domoina, are committed to serving patients both physically and spiritually.



When asking Malagasy citizens to describe their country, they say things like, "the country attracts many tourists due to its beautiful land. The fauna and flora is one of the most unique on earth. Most Malagasy people are Christians, and the people are kind, gentle and hopeful. Madagascans are hard-working despite the poor living conditions. Being the most diverse country in the world, with a blended culture and ethnicity, they are somewhat isolated from everything else."

One MMT pastor notes that "Madagascar is beautifully poor. In the midst of great poverty, the colors of the land and people are vibrant and bright. The soil is red; the clothing a rainbow of colors. The people are joyous, peaceful, loving



and at peace with each other and with God." MMT volunteers say, "Malagasy people are sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, yet possessing everything. They are a happy, grateful and kind people. The people have amazing happiness glowing in their smiles. Madagascar is such a beautiful country, which makes the extreme poverty affecting the majority of the population, so incomprehensible. The extreme beauty lies not only on its scenic routes, winding roads and countryside, but also in the hearts and souls of the people encountered while working at the clinic. Travel in Madagascar is like no other. Flash downpours can turn the soil into thick clay mud that vehicles can barely pass through, and often get stuck."

Healthcare on this island is very limited, and lack of access to healthcare is prevalent throughout the country. Malnutrition, hernias, vision loss, massive goiters that obstruct airways, skin lesions including leprosy, scabies and parasitic wounds are prevalent. According to recent statistics from US Aid, 10 Malagasy women die from complications of childbirth every day. Less than 50% of live births are attended to by trained medical staff. Women are transported to health centers via oxcart while in labor, and many complications and miscarriages occur in route to the medical centers. Midwives in Madagascar are paid an average of \$230 USD per month, and emergency Cesarean sections cost approx. \$150 USD each. Ultrasounds are accessible to 30% of women in urban regions and 7% of homes in rural settings. Midst the COVID pandemic, statistics are skewed due to lack of reporting, but there have been over 18,000 COVID positive cases and 280 deaths. Life expectancy has increased over the years; it is now estimated to be 66 years.





It is exciting to know that over 40% of the country are practicing Christians, and the Malagasy Lutheran church has over 3 million baptized members. Norwegian missionaries first introduced the Malagasy to the Lutheran faith in 1866. The Malagasy Lutheran Church (AKA FLM), established in 1950, is one of the most important Christian churches in Madagascar. The people of Madagascar have great faith that God will provide what they need for each day. One MMT member recalls the massive number of people attending church services and the need to make a reservation to attend church. One must arrive early to get a seat, otherwise they

stand outside the windows, listening to the service which can last well over 2 hours.

Today, due to COVID-19, there are very few outreach clinics available, so LIMM has helped support the outreach of the Lutheran Hospital so they can continue to provide free and low-cost health care. Your donations have touched the lives of thousands of people in this country, and LIMM thanks you for your support!
